

5. To make the camping week successful, each teacher will be assigned a specific responsibility in the program.
6. Teachers will be expected to attend classes unless their assigned duties interfere.
7. Permission may be obtained for boys to go on tours (if accompanied by their teachers) during free periods after breakfast, and in the afternoon.
8. Swimming shall be permitted only at designated times and under the supervision of a qualified lifeguard.
9. Smoking is prohibited in cabins.
10. There shall not be any horse-play in the cabins.
11. Cabins and grounds must be kept clean. Beds must be made daily.
12. No person with swim or athletic attire on is permitted in the dining room or kitchen.
13. Campers retire to cabins at 10:00 p.m. Lights go off each night at 10:30 p.m. It is the responsibility of each teacher to see that his boys are in bed and quiet.

- 6:30 A.M.—First Call.
- 7:00 A.M.—Each cabin will have roll call and be present for calisthenics and flag raising. NOTE: Different groups will be assigned to take care of the raising and lowering of the flag.
- There will be an effort made to elect officers Monday night. The Camp Manager will make whatever adjustment he finds necessary.
- 7:30 A.M.—Breakfast.
- 8:30 A.M.—Inspection of quarters by committee appointed by the Counselors.

SUGGESTIONS FOR CARRYING OUT THE CAMP PROGRAM

The afternoon program should be organized so as to be enjoyable, and at the same time, give the campers training in leadership and citizenship. The boys should be under close supervision of the counselors at all time.

The group in charge of the Vesper Program should be sure that the boys have been trained to perform in such a way that the program will carry out the meaning of Vesper.

SUGGESTIONS FOR CAMP-FIRE PROGRAM

1. One night the program may consist of a talent hunt with each cabin being represented.
2. One group may give a demonstration on "How to Conduct a Social."
3. Dramatics, plays, dialogues or skits be given by using what is available for curtains, stage, etc., with the boys playing the different characters.
 - (a) Such plays could be based on the doing of farm jobs, stunts, tacky contest, panel discussions, singing and other activities. (Other enterprises and jobs on the farm, in the community, and television could be dramatized and done so well that the audience would understand what the play is about).
4. Clean, entertaining jokes and games.

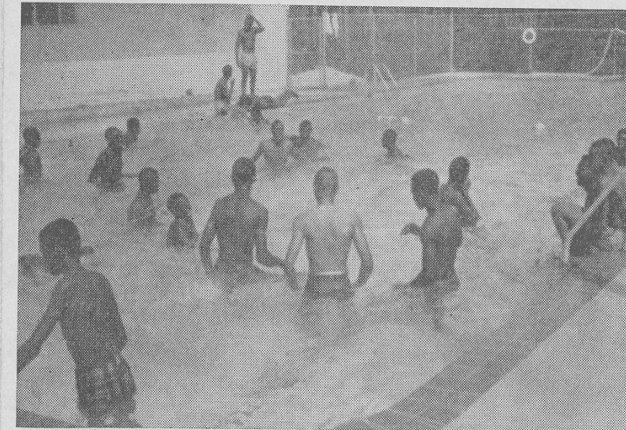
BECOMING A SUCCESSFUL CAMPER

Monday will be devoted to organization and getting acquainted.

The proposed organization suggested for each cabin:

1. Two counselors (teachers shall be selected)
2. Each cabin will have the following officers:
 - a. Advisor—one or the counselors
 - b. President
 - c. Vice President
 - d. Secretary
 - e. Treasurer
 - f. Reporter
 - g. Other teachers in the cabin shall assist the counselors
3. The campers in each cabin shall nominate a candidate for Camp Chief.
 - a. They should nominate one person to assist the counselors on conducting the election.
 - b. Arrangement should be made by the Counselors to conduct campaign speeches at the Monday night Campfire.
 - c. The Camp Manager and other workers may adjust this plan. All campers are expected to register and vote by ballot.
4. The elected Camp Chief, Nominees, Chief Counselor and Camp Director shall serve as Camp Court.
5. The Camp Court will select the best camper, best boy in leadership, best boy in sportsmanship, etc.
 - A. *Best Camper*—The following should be considered in making the selection.
 1. Co-operation with other campers.
 2. Attending organized instruction and participating in different activities.
 3. Keeping the camp area orderly, etc.
 - B. *Best All-Round Athlete* — The following should be considered in making the selection (With emphasis on leadership).
 1. Take part in all recreation activities
 2. Play all activities well
 3. Show good sportsmanship

C. *Best Leadership*

1. Be a good leader of boys
2. Other boys respect his judgment
3. Be selected as leader of group, and prove to be a good leader

D. *Best in Arts and Crafts*

1. Largest number of articles made
2. Quality of articles
3. Originality

E. *Swimming and Water Safety*

1. Ability to develop skill in swimming
2. Observe safety regulations
3. Always cooperate with swimming director
4. Never horse-play while in the pool
5. Ability to obey swimming director

F. *Best Electrician*

1. Attend all meetings and be on time
2. Make at least one electrical item
3. Demonstrate the ability to make the most use out of electricity for the safety of the home

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. Teachers and campers should arrive and register before 11:00 a.m. on Monday and remain through lunch on Friday. Teachers should bring only boys who are willing to participate in the complete program at the Camp.
2. Teachers must accompany their group to the Camp and be responsible for their conduct and welfare at all times. Exception to this rule will be made only after written approval has been given by the Camp Director.
 - a. The Camp Manager reserves the right to send the camper home at the expense of teacher or camper who fails to cooperate or comply with the camping program and regulations.
3. The teacher and his boys shall be housed together and the teacher will be responsible for the behavior of his boys. Adjustments may be made by the Manager and workers at Camp.
4. All teachers will be expected to remain at the Camp during the week. If it becomes necessary, for any reason, for a teacher to leave, he must work this out with the Camp Manager.
