




Three Component Model

Every achievement, from a new grant to an updated classroom, is driven by one singular purpose: ensuring every student has the skills and confidence to succeed.






- › In **411 schools** across North Carolina, over **600 agriculture teachers** interact with and teach over **71,000 middle and high school students** every day.
- › North Carolina Teach Ag efforts recruit and retain high-quality agriculture teachers; the results: the number of **undergraduate agriculture majors** across our four agricultural teacher-preparation institutions **has increased by nearly 200%** since 2014.
- › Teach Ag partner institutions include North Carolina Agricultural Education staff and faculty at our **four agricultural education institutions**: North Carolina State University, Appalachian State University, North Carolina A&T State University, and the University of Mount Olive.
